Interesting Facts  - Liverpool has the largest collection of Grade II-listed buildings outside London Liverpool is the Capital of Cultur e for 2008.	I will use an atlas and Google maps to locate the UK. I will learn that the UK is divided into four countries. I will the capital cities of each of these countries and the different attractions in each capital city. I will learn that Liverpool is a city in the North West of England.  I will use Google maps to explore Liverpool and identify the different attractions around the city. I will look at the different human features (Liver building, Anfield football stadium, World museum and Radio City tower) and the physical features (Crosby Beach, River Mersey).  I will use photographs to recognise landmarks in the city. I will explore the landmarks and top attractions in Liverpool.  I will learn why we have postcodes and they are used. I will use Digimaps to enter postcodes and flag places of interest in Liverpool. I will learn about why the area codes change.  I will go on a walk on the local area. I will draw a simple map of the area including street names.
