Anglo Saxons invaded. That Highwaymen were typically men on horseback who hold up	In Tudor times most crime was theft of money, food or belongings however the punishments were severe and designed to warn others not to commit similar crimes. These punishments included the stoning, branding, drowning and the stocks. In Tudor times there were still no police. Crime-mainly stealing- was widespread, as many poor people could not afford to pay for increasingly expensive food. New punishments were created to be even more terrifying than before e.g. beheadings, the ducking stool or burning at the stake. Highwaymen became a greater threat during the Georgian periods. Britain still did not have a police force, so it was difficult to catch highwaymen. There were large rewards for their capture. Most highwaymen were eventually caught and hung. As the Victorians had a police force, they were able to control crimes better.
